








# The 2016 Election

## RESULTS FROM A NATIONALLY REPRESENTATIVE SURVEY OF YOUNG PEOPLE AGE 18-30 TAKEN JULY 9-20...

- African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as are more likely to vote for Hillary Clinton than Donald Trump while whites are divided
- African Americans strongly favor Clinton to Trump (57 percent vs. 2 percent) as do Asian Americans (50 percent vs. 9 percent)
- More Latino/as favor Clinton than Trump (43 percent vs. 11 percent) while whites are split between Trump and Clinton (27 percent vs. 25 percent, respectively)
- Overall, more young people would vote for Clinton (35 percent) than Trump (19 percent)

#### Young whites are split between Trump and Clinton % who would vote for...




Question: If the general election were held today, and the candidates were Hillary Clinton for the Democrats, Donald Trump for the Republicans, Gary Johnson for the Libertarian Party, and Jill Stein for the Green Party, for whom would you vote?

- Third party candidates are mostly unknown across all racial and ethnic groups
- About 7 in 10 do not know enough about Gary Johnson to have an opinion of him while nearly 8 in 10 say the same about Jill Stein
- Only 8 percent of young people would vote for Gary Johnson while 4 percent would vote for Jill Stein
- Whites are the most likely to believe Hillary Clinton intentionally broke the law with her use of a private email address as Secretary of State
- A majority of whites (54 percent) say Clinton intentionally broke the law compared with 32 percent of Latino/as, 29 percent of Asian Americans, and 21 percent of African Americans
- Overall, 43 percent say she intentionally broke the law, 20 percent report she broke the law, but it was not intentional, 27 percent say she showed poor judgement, but did not do anything illegal, and 8 percent report she did nothing wrong

- African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as have more positive attitudes toward the Democratic Party than the Republican Party
- African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as view the Democratic Party as more inclusive of people with different perspectives and as caring about people like them than the Republican Party
- Whites have mixed opinions about both major parties
- Majorities of all races think the Republican Party is too extreme while less than 3 in 10 young African Americans, Asian Americans, and Latino/as think the Democratic Party is too extreme

#### Less than half of Bernie Sanders supporters say they are willing to vote for Hillary Clinton

- Going into the Democratic National Convention, less than half of African American (48 percent), Asian American (48 percent), white (43 percent) and Latino/as (40 percent) Sanders supporters say they would vote for Clinton
- Few Sanders backers would vote for Trump either: 6 percent of Latino/as, 3 percent of whites, 2 percent of Asian Americans, and 1 percent of African Americans

Data come from GenForward, a survey of the Black Youth Project at the University of Chicago with the AP-NORC Center, with a nationally representative sample of 1,940 adults 18-30 years old. Interviews were completed online and using landlines and cellphones from July 9-20, 2016. Results have a margin of sampling error of +/- 3.8 percentage points.
